Course Catalog Description: This course provides a background, framework and vocabulary for the appreciation of six major areas of production (director, actor, designer/technician, playwright, script, and audience) and the various historical, textual, and performative elements that inform theatrical practice. Students will read a variety of plays, attend productions by the Theatre Arts Program, and participate in a course module involving production creation.

Student Learning University Outcomes & Course Objectives:

USO 1: Biblically Rooted – Demonstrate spiritual literacy, including Biblical Christian faith and practice, Baptist perspectives, and the Christian's role in fulfilling the Great Commission.

Objective 1: Students will encounter various types of drama and engage in discussions that explore the Christian worldview in secular productions.

USO 2: Globally Minded - Respect diverse religious, cultural, philosophical, and aesthetic experiences and perspectives.

Objective 2: Students will encounter various types of drama that all have diverse backgrounds.

Objective 2.1: Students will attend both CBU productions designed to open their mind to different cultures, languages, perspectives and even musical styles.

USO 3: Academically Prepared - Use critical thinking skills to demonstrate literacy: listening, speaking, writing, reading, viewing, and visual presentation.

Objective 3.1: Students will complete multiple critical thinking assignments (individually, in group settings, submitting online and presenting in class). Students will develop a well-versed vocabulary in theatrical terms and be able to articulate them via multiple theatrical critiques on professional productions, as well as numerous class presentations.

Objective 3.2: Participation is a large part of the course grade because student involvement is the catalyst to success in the course. In class assignments encourage listening and speaking literacy. **Objective 3.3:** Students will discuss and develop an appreciation for theatre as a whole, as well as comprehend what it takes to put up a production from start to finish.

- USO 4: Academically Prepared- Demonstrate competency in math, science, & technological skills. Objective 4: Students will be exposed to and work with the latest theatrical technologies. They will learn the basics and course assignments will ensure hands on application.
- USO 5: Equipped to Serve Transfer academic studies to a profession and the workplace.
 Objective 5: Students will explore multiple careers in theater, perhaps sparking interest for some or at the very least, appreciation.

USO 6: Equipped to Serve - Implement a personal and social ethic that results in informed participation in multiple levels of community.

Objective 6: Students will explore and discover different ways that theater gives back and how important volunteers are to the theatrical community.



Assignment Descriptions:

Attendance/Participation/Reading (200 points total): Attendance, along with your participation in class will contribute to your participation points each class meeting. We will have detailed discussions in class and your participation is imperative to the success and progression of our classroom. Reading is required and there will be quizzes addressing topics and facts from the reading.

Theatrical Experience Essay (20 pts.): Half page assignment touching on your preconceived notions and/or experience with the theatre.

Come From Away Project (30 pts.): Assignment focusing on the events surrounding 9/11.

Actor Profile & Presentation (25 pts.): A one-page handout detailing the life and contributions of someone important and/or influential to you that is connected to the theatre somehow. You will present your handout to the class.

Chapter Presentation (35 Points): Groups of Students will choose one chapter to present to the class via an in-class assignment/activity. Presentation must be roughly 10 minutes long.

Play Reviews or Monologues (40 pts. each): You will write two critiques, one chosen by me, one chosen by you. You have the option to swap one critique for a monologue from that play instead. It MUST be memorized and performed in class.

CBU Theatre Production Attendance/Review (40 pts. each): Students are required to attend both CBU productions. You will turn in your ticket, along with a review/critique of each production.

Theatrical Assignments (40 pts. each): 3 assignments that align with the text in the book, costumes, set design, social media. These assignments will touch on various aspects of theatre in order to familiarize you with each different speciality.

Theatre Game (30 pts): You will find and choose a theatre game to present and play in class. You must turn in a document via BB that details the instructions for the game.

Musical Theatre Sound Design Assignment (35 pts): Using Qlab, you will build a sound design. More details will be discussed in class. This is your teacher's favorite genre!

The Theatre Project (150 pts.): Semester long group project. More info on BB and in class.

Quizzes/Final (50 pts: 3 quizzes/10 pts. each.1 Final/20 pts.): There will be three content quizzes. We will have a class designated to review and prep for each quiz. Every quiz will include some items from the previous quiz. The final will review all key terms and ideas.

DNA Play (100 pts.): Your final presentation. A 5-minute, non-verbal, theatrical representation of your life, or a major event from your life. What makes you, you? Details in class.

Extra Credit Opportunities (5 pts.): Attend ANY LIVE performance and receive 5 pts. for bringing in or emailing a copy of either a ticket stub or program from the performance.



Choose Your Own Adventure Assignments (45 pts): Below are 3 assignments designed for various learning types. Choose one assignment that seems the most interesting to you.

1. Create Your Own In-Class Assignment – Design an in-class assignment relevant to a portion of the course. You will then teach and implement your assignment during a class period.

2. Research Paper – Your research paper can be on anything pertaining to this class. The choice is yours, but your topic must be approved by me. This is NOT presented in class.

3. Monologue or Musical Theatre Performance – Choose any monologue or song (from a musical or play) to present to the class. It must be memorized and well-rehearsed.
